
Resilient and Efficient @ 57 #TuloyAngDaloyNIA Adapting to the COVID-19 Pandemic: The NIA Way

The National Irrigation Administration (NIA) has conducted an immediate site inspection and investigation of the reported damage on Rubber Bladder No. 5 of Angat Afterbay Regulator Dam (AARD) located at Barangay Tibagan, Bustos, Bulacan on May 13, 2020 after NIA Regional Office No. III sought technical assistance from NIA Central Office.

The action was taken as a result of a meeting called by Deputy Administrator for Engineering and Operations Sector C'zar M. Sulaik on May 12, 2020 via Zoom Application, which was attended by the concerned personner from Engineering Department, Regional Office, and Bulacan-Aurora-Nueva Ecija Irrigation Management Office (BANE IMO).

During the meeting, it was discussed that the rubber materials have passed the testing conducted by Beijing Research and Development Institute (BRDI) on April 24-26, 2017, as requested by the Contractor, ITP Construction, Inc. – Guangxi Hydroelectric Construction Bureau Co., Ltd. Consortium. To ensure the conformity of materials with the NIA Technical specifications, the Agency conducted Pre-Delivery Inspection as part of the Quality Control Program for the Rehabilitation of AARD.

In addition, one of the agreements during the meeting was to immediately call the attention of the Contractor regarding the incident, where in the damaged rubber bladder shall be replaced by the contracting party as part of the 20-year warranty period policy from 2017 to 2037. NIA also instructed the Contractor to coordinate with the Regional Office to determine the best remedial measure to address the problem.

After a series of discussions, the Contractor and the NIA Regional Office No. III decided that a cofferdam shall be constructed by the Contractor, without any cost to NIA. This will serve as a temporary replacement of the Rubber Bladder at Bay No. 5 prior to the replacement of the damaged Rubber Bladder.

On May 22, 2020, Deputy Administrator Sulaik chaired a joint evaluation and discussion regarding the proposed cofferdam design with the technical personnel of the Regional Office and Engineering Department. As an outcome, the contractor committed to revise their proposal by incorporating NIA's recommendations and submit the same in the soonest possible time. Similarly, it was agreed that the Contractor shall start immediately with mobilization and preparatory works, but will not proceed with the actual construction of the cofferdam until the final design plans are approved.

At present, the Contractor had already completed all preparatory works. Correspondingly, the Notice to Commence Work was issued to the Contractor after NIA Central Office approved the design plans from the Regional Office. It is noted that the design plans are critical and shall be evaluated thoroughly prior to the actual execution of the construction works.

NIA Administrator Ricardo R. Visaya assured that NIA is doing its best to continuously deliver efficient, reliable, and sustainable irrigation service to the Filipino farmers despite the ongoing rehabilitation works and prevailing COVID-19 Pandemic Situation.



AR INSPECTION OF ANGAT BAY REGULATOR DAM

Immediately after the reported collapse of the Rubber Gate No. 5, the National Irrigation Administration (NIA), headed by Administrator Ricardo R. Visaya, and the Provincial Government of Bulacan, headed by Governor Daniel R. Fernando, conducted an ocular inspection of Angat Afterbay Regulator Dam (Bustos Dam) located at Barangay Tibagan, Bustos, Bulacan on June 09, 2020.

Upon site inspection, a meeting was held among the officials of NIA, Provincial Government of Bulacan, and ITP Construction, Inc. – Guangxi Hydroelectric Construction Bureau Co., Ltd. Consortium (Contractor) to discuss matters arising from the incident.

Since the replacement of the rubber bladder is part of the 20-year warranty period policy from 2017 to 2037, a cofferdam is now being constructed by the Contractor, without any cost to NIA, to ensure that irrigation will be provided and the farming activities of the farmers will not be hampered. Completion of the said cofferdam is due on July 15, 2020.

To further guarantee the integrity of the rubber bladder, a material testing will be undertaken by a third party contractor either in Singapore or Australia and will be carried out by July. All six rubber bladders of Bustos Dam were agreed to be replaced as permanent solution to its damages.

Administrator Visaya emphasized that even Bustos Dam is primarily used for irrigation purposes, the safety and security of the people living in provinces is the top priority of the Agency.

Meanwhile, NIA Regional Manager Josephine B. Salazar reported in the meeting that 6,500 farmers in the South Sector not covered by irrigation service delivery in the last cropping season to pave way for water allocation on households in the National Capital Region (NCR), will be receiving a total of P15 million worth of subsidies and financial assistance from Metropolitan Waterworks and Sewerage System (MWSS).

MOU Signing on EPAHP

On December 9, 2019, Administrator Ricardo R. Visaya represented NIA as one of the partners who signed the memorandum of understanding (MOU) on Enhanced Partnership Against Hunger and Poverty (EPAHP) Program at the Malacañang Palace. EPAHP is an enhanced version of Partnership Against Hunger and Poverty (PAHP) which aims to eradicate hunger and poverty by 2030.



Signing of MOU sealed the alliance and convergence of government agencies, such as Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), Department of Agriculture (DA) Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), Department of Education (DepEd), Department of Health (DoH), Department of Science and Technology (DOST), Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), National Anti-Poverty Commission (NAPC), National Irrigation Administration (NIA), and Land Bank of the Philippines, which services are essential to food security and poverty reduction, EPAHP's goal.



There are three clusters under EPAHP Institutional Framework of convergence and synergy, namely: Support Services, Supply, and Demand. Along with this, NIA belongs to Support Services cluster through the rehabilitation and construction of irrigation facilities, as well as Supply cluster through the participation of Irrigators Associations.

EPAHP program components include the following: Provisions for institutional feeding program, Credit support for community-based organizations, Capacity-building and productivity improvement for community-based organizations (this is where IAs are involved), Nutrition education (for both consumers and producers), Agricultural facilities and technologies, food hubs, and other infrastructure facilities, Funding, technical and research assistance from the development and other local partners (e.g. FAO, WFP), and, advocacy and education.

Likewise, the following are the strategies for the Program: Convergence and synchronization of programs and projects, Credit assistance to support food production, processing, and marketing, Linkage of participating community-based organizations (CBOs) to prospective markets, Enhancement of provisions of agricultural and fishery inputs and services to farmers and fisherfolk organizations or CBOs, Sustainability of the program through the engagement of the private sector and institutionalization of mechanisms in LGUs that would allow the adoption of EPAHP, and Adoption of the Community Participation Procurement Manual (CPPM) to allow participation of CBOs in the program.

Initial NIA Action

In 2019, the Agency through IDD had an initial target of three IAs per province nationwide capacitated for 2020 as service provider, and at least 50% increase in the number of capacitated IA per year with at least 10% increase in income of IA households participating in this Program. Initial list of participating IAs then was 75 from different regions.

To attain such target, IDD shall conduct a resource mapping to all its organized farmers, irrigators associations, nationwide to come up with a list of IAs capable of becoming supplier to the demands of other partner agencies for program's implementation. Partners agencies under *Demands Cluster* include the following: DSWD's Supplementary Feeding Program and Feeding for Residential Care Facilities, DepEd's School-Based Feeding Program, DOH-retained Hospitals, In-patient Feeding, Feeding Program for Severely Malnourished and Pregnant Women, and DILG's Government Food Requirement for Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDL).

Furthermore, IDD aimed to a link capacitated IAs with other partner agencies for credit and other related support services to meet the growing needs and demands of clients.

Plans and Programs

Updates of NIA's actions on EPAHP

A virtual meeting was held on June 24, 2020 by IDD Manager Leo L. Gallego with the IDP implementers nationwide, 222 irrigators associations (IAs) are ready to be possible partners as suppliers or food producers of rice, vegetables or root crops and as service providers, such as catering services, use of IA's training facility/ center for a fee, thus to make them more self-reliant.

EPAHP Budget of P'18M by 2021 and IDD **Presentation**

NIA joined EPAHP in November 2019 right after the BiCam Committee Meeting approved 2020 NIA Budget. Consistent with Executive Order (EO) 101, s. 2020 creating Inter Agency Task Force on Zero Hunger, CabSec Nograles during steering committee meeting on February 12, 2020, stressed the need for the member agencies to include EPAHP in 2020 Budget. Thus, for 2020 activities, all expenditures will be charged under IMTSS assistance program. However, P18 million is allocated for EPAHP activities in

Pursuant to Republic Act (RA) No. 11469 or the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act", the National Irrigation Administration (NIA) heeds the request of the Department of Finance to remit to the Bureau of Treasury the amount of One Billion Pesos (P1,000,000,000.00) from the unutilized subsidy of the Agency as a contribution of Government-Owned and Controlled Corporations (GOCC) in the implementation of health, safety, and emergency measures to prevent, contain, and mitigate the spread of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) in the country.

NIA in its commitment not just in the agricultural sector but also in reinforcing, sustaining, and cushioning the country's economic activities during the onslaught of the pandemic reassessed and identified programs, activities, and projects (PAPs) that can no longer be completed within the current fiscal year (FY) under FY 2018, 2019, and 2020 General Appropriations Act (GAA).

The assessment and identification course came after the Department of Budget and Management's (DBM) National Budget Circular No. 580 or the Adoption of Economy Measures in the Government Due to the Emergency Health Situation, and the GCG Memorandum Order No. 2020-04 pertaining to RA 11469.

THE BOARD RESPONDS TO **COVID-19 CHALLENGES**

Atty. Jiselle Rae A. Villamor, the Corporate Board Secretary of the National Irrigation Administration (NIA), shares experiences on how the Office of the Corporate Board Secretary (OCBS) responds to the challenges brought by the pandemic. She said, "I guess one of the challenges we have encountered in the pandemic was that no one knew the gravity of its effects. Though our Office, in anticipation of the lockdown, has adopted means to ensure continuity of work, we still felt that the preparation was never enough especially when we had to deal with different offices both internally and externally."

Though OCBS faced sorts of challenges, thankfully, they were able to pull it off. The Office adapted work from home arrangement, and scheduled regular virtual staff meetings on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Whenever necessary, they also took note of deadlines and stuck to it. She revealed that never a day went by that they would not hear from each other, "I think it was really necessary to be up to date about what's going on with everyone in the group. The crisis has hit all of us in varying degrees and what we wanted to get as an assurance was that we are in this together." Atty. Villamor encouraged the staff to take good care of themselves not only physically, but also mentally, and made constant reminders to everyone to never hesitate seeking help whenever needed during

For Atty. Villamor, government services, even those not classified as frontline services, do not cease just because of the pandemic. She believes that "all should work in synergy to achieve greater impact. There is no job too small. All the more that in times of crisis, public servants should stay committed to duties and rise above any occasion but always with welfare and health risk mitigation in mind".

The Office of the Corporate Board Secretary is responsible for providing advice and adequate resources to the Board of Directors in the performance of its oversight functions. The Corporate Board Secretary reports directly to Cabinet Secretary Karlo B.Nograles as Chairman of the Board, and coordinates with all the members. A viber group was in placed before the advent of pandemic hence, a constant exchange of information among the Board members. "I am fortunate that the members, individually, are also within reach and responsive. But more than ever, it was during this time that I have to be more direct and precise in delivering my message to them given the limited time due to demands from their respective departments especially that the Chairman sits as co-chair and spokesperson of the Inter-Agency Task Force for COVID-19," she said.

The (COVID-19) challenge requires physical distancing as one of the Minimum Health Standards, as such the Corporate Board Secretary set alternative ways for the Board to fulfill its duties effectively through setting strategies and direction in accordance with existing laws and standards. The Board had no choice but to defer the 957th Regular Board Meeting last March 26, 2020 since the members decided to table the deliberation of project proposals to the next meeting. According to Atty. Villamor, "As discussed with the Chairman during the first few days of the lockdown, it was agreed that we shift our focus to support the efforts of the management in that we shift our focus to support the efforts of the management in the containment of COVID-19 and discuss the situation of farmers, production and the 'seed to shelf' movement.'

The Corporate Secretary intimated that the Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) did not affect the consensual decisions of the Board, and confident that all decisions the Board made during the lockdown were based on well informed judgments. She declared, "But despite the absence of a meeting in March, we still managed to decide on two important matters and adopted resolutions through a unanimous written consent in lieu of a meeting. I sent them all the documents to their email addresses and had them register their votes by following a format. I even conducted a survey through viber just to explicitly show each one's vote. One of the resolutions adopted was NIA's response to COVID-19 under the Bayanihan to Heal As One Act. I am fully aware that NIA as a GOCC needs to submit documentary requirements to other agencies so I deemed it necessary to have had it prepared and approved whatever it took me to do so. Thankfully, all the members were very cooperative and responsive."

In addition to its core functions, OCBS assists outside agencies such as the Office of the President, NEDA and Department of Energy (DOE), among others, in its concerns relating to NIA with prompt response from the Administrator.

When asked how the pandemic affects the working dynamics within the Board, Atty. Jiselle informed that the Board continued on helping the management find the right balance in handling the crisis like sharing of crisis management experiences and inputs as well as giving recommendations. It also provides guidance to the Management in the determination of budget components to be reduced or adjusted. The Board provided inputs in consideration of NIA's performance targets with or without the lockdown.

Plans and Programs

According to Atty. Villamor, the Board exchanged less serious topics virtually in the midst of crisis. The Board exchanged amusing conversations in their group chat. They shared all sorts of messages from inspirational, jokes, memes and latest trends to the group. It sparked conversation outside of work and helped care for their mental health during the quarantine.

Anticipating the crisis will eventually end and the measures adopted to handle the situation will cease, Atty. Villamor with the new normal, hoped to introduce changes to the Board post pandemic. One major initiative is the revision of the NIA By-Laws to include ways for the Board to effectively act on matters remotely through virtual meetings and written consent. The NIA By-Laws was adopted in January 1975 and upon her assumption, its review and revision were one of the agenda. The pandemic prompted the Corporate Board Secretary to firm up the plan the soonest possible time. She added that while the corporate governance standards and other Philippine laws allow the Board to transact and conduct business other than in-person meeting, no other than the by-laws which establish the rules for the Board to carry out its duties must reflect the same to address the demands of changing times.





The Board conducted its 957th and 958th meetings by teleconferencing on 28 April 2020 and 21 May 2020, respectively. A total of 21 proposals were deliberated and decided upon.

"When the dust settles, I think it is really important for all of us to reflect on the lessons learned during this crisis. In stepping up to our game, we need to assess what went right, what went wrong and how to better prepare for the future," Atty. Villamor concluded. 299

NIA IMPLEMENTS PURGED SKELETON WORKFORCE, PROVIDES HAZARD PAY TO QUALIFIED EMPLOYEES

In line with the government's effort of implementing stringent Social Distancing and Enhanced Community Quarantine in the entire Luzon, NIA Administrator Ricardo R. Visaya instructed the Middle Management to further purge the list of the Agency's skeleton workforce for submission to Deputy Administrator for Administrative and Finance Sector Romeo G. Gan, through Human Resources Division, Administrative Department (HRD-AD), at 5:00 PM today, March 23, 2020.

In his directive, Administrator Visaya emphasized the importance of limiting skeletal workers by minimizing employees who report once a week in the office, prioritizing stay-in personnel as part of skeleton workforce, and implementing Work from Home Arrangement.

In line with this, Deputy Administrator Gan ordered the resubmission of the list of skeleton workforce to HRD and to limit the same at the barest minimum.

"Let us be more innovative. Assigning our people to report once a week will even be more to further exposure. We can prioritize stay-in personnel as our skeletal workforce. Do not lose sight of the purpose of quarantine. We have to be strict and conscientious about this", Deputy Administrator Gan said.

To further ensure employees' compensation and welfare, NIA also provided Hazard Pay to all employees reporting for work amid quarantine. W

The main purpose of the Task Force is to immediately respond and provide medical attention to NIA personnel and ultimately, for the prevention, containment, and mitigation of the said virus within the C.O. premises.

The C.O. dormitory was purposely used as an isolation building to house NIA personnel with symptomatic and asymptomatic signs or identified as "Suspect", "Probable", "Confirmed" cases as new categories of DOH & WHO, or Confirmed COVID-Positive Patient. Two NIA service vehicles were assigned as NIA Ambulance. Ambulance.

ADAPTING TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC: THE NIA WAY

Through the efforts of the top management officials headed by Administrator Ricardo R. Visaya, the National Irrigation Administration (NIA) in its pursuit in keeping the Agency Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) free came up with ways to ensure the health and safety of its employees.

Vehicles entering Central Office (C.O.) premises will go through a spray with finely diffused jet of chlorine dioxide liquid (disinfectant, sterilizer, and sanitizer) to prevent the virus from spreading on NIA. the virus from spreading on NIA grounds. The Agency also conducts disinfection to the entire C.O. buildings during the Enhanced Community Quarantine period until now that the National Capital Region is under the General Community Quarantine.

On the other hand, employees, tenants, and visitors will go through a screening process handled by the Response Operations Group (ROG) of the NIA-C.O. Task Force headed by Dr. Catherin Binag before one can actually enter the building. Four easy steps were to follow before proceeding to their respective offices or areas: (1) A security personnel checks the employee/visitors temperature using a handheld thermal scanner then signs on the given Pass Slip, (2) Passing through the lobby thermal scanner, a Civil Security Affairs personnel will sign the Pass Slip, (3-4) An ROG personnel checks the employee/visitors temperature using a handheld thermal scanner, interviews if experiencing CoViD-19 symptoms, records the data on their database, and signs the Pass Slip. If the employee/visitor is free from any symptoms or disease, he can now proceed to his office or area.

NIA-C.O. also provided multivitamins, face shield, face mask, and alcohol upon the resumption of work of all employees on June 1, 2020.

The launching of #TuloyAngDaloyNIA on April 7, 2020 has unified the social media posts of the National Irrigation Administration (NIA) Skeleton Workforce during the period of extended Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ), and continued its use in the country's transition to General Community Quarantine (GCQ). The NIA Facebook Pages have served as the primary platforms of NIA Operations and Maintenance (O&M) activities nationwide showing the NIA personnel's active work engagement in the fulfillment of the Agency's mandate and continuous delivery of basic irrigation services to the Filipino farmers.

#TuloyAngDaloyNIA originated from the timely experience of NIA Upper Pampanga River Integrated Irrigation Systems (NIA-UPRIIS) when hashtag suggestions were solicited by NIA PAIS. The Office then was in the course of completing the initial restoration works due to an incident of sudden damage in the canal embankment along the Super Diversion Canal (SDC) and Diversion Canal 1 (DC-1) in Rizal, Nueva Ecija on March 28, 2020. Fears surrounded the farmers in 15 cities and municipalities covering the affected service areas of UPRIIS. However, UPRIIS Department Manager Rosalinda B. Bote did not allow the irrigation water supply to be compromised to the remaining 49,900-hectare rice crops during that time. The crops were mostly on its early growth stage while some were just counting a few days before harvest.

At the time when the whole nation was conquering the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) threat on food security, NIA cannot afford to fail the farmers' crop water requirement. UPRIIS has always aimed to increase rice production every cropping season, especially that it is the biggest irrigation system in NIA. Since it is strategically located in Nueva Ecija, the Rice Granary of the Philippines, it was expected that higher yield will be produced. Thus, the challenge to realize a higher volume of palay harvest was real.

During the incident of canal embankment damage, fleet from UPRIIS Head Office was immediately dispatched on March 28 for remedial repair measures in Rizal. Following shortly was the Management's request for equipment augmentation from the nearest contractor in town. UPRIIS was faced with limitations in access of construction needs, due to locked-down cities and municipalities in Nueva Ecija, but the proactive response of the Management allowed the periodic initial water release later that day. Upon the advice of experts who assessed the condition of the diversion canals, Masiway Dam resumed the regular release of irrigation water on March 29, 2020 from its main source, the Pantabangan Dam, to supply the remaining affected areas downstream.

See how engaging the work of NIA field personnel gets in monitoring the water distribution and delivery (WDD) to the farms, and assessing the status of farming activities amid the growing threat of the pandemic. These, among many other duties and responsibilities of NIA to the farmers, pave way for the farmers to occupy a soft spot in the heart of every NIAn. It appeared to be a major consideration in pursuit and attainment of farmers' satisfaction.

#TuloyAngDaloyNIA is a reminder for all NIAns that whatever happens, even in the middle of virus threat or any other challenges, NIA must continue the flow whatever the situation is. Not even the natural calamities that pose damage in irrigation structures and facilities can stop NIA from rendering its basic services.

NIA still and always finds a way to let the irrigation water flow and reach the farms – for rice crops will not survive without irrigation water supply. The Agency also ensures the effectivity of its O&M activities, sustainability of irrigation systems, and efficiency of its facilities. 




